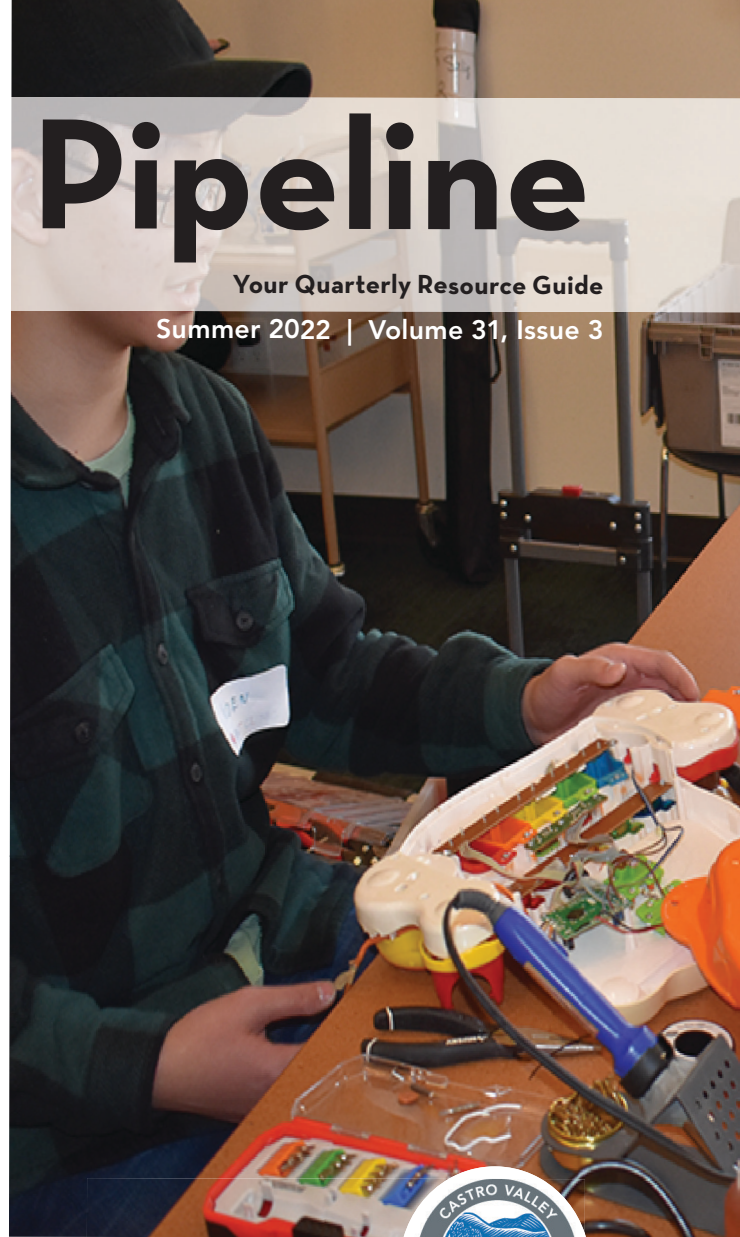

Operations and Engineering Building Project Update



CVSsan staff is excited to continue moving forward with the Operations and Engineering Building Project, located on the corner of Castro Valley Boulevard and Center Street. CVSan's architectural design firm, Dahlin Group, prepared the construction documents and the building permit submittal to Alameda County in April. CVSan will call for bids this summer.

Construction is expected to start this Fall and the project is expected to be completed in late 2023.

Your Rates

On May 3rd CVSan’s Board of Directors unanimously approved Ordinance No. 192, which increases the rates for solid waste services by an average of 0.22%, or \$0.07 for a 20 gallon single-family customer effective July 1, 2022.

The rate for CVSan customers is based on the latest detailed rate review for this rate period. CVSan uses a third party to review solid waste service rates on an annual basis. CVSan staff devotes significant effort to analyzing the advantages and disadvantages of potential rate increases. Learn more about your rates and rate adjustments at cvsan.org/YourRates.

New Recycling and Organics Law: SB1383

When organic material, such as food, plant debris, and food-soiled paper is buried in a landfill, it produces harmful greenhouse gases. To address this issue, California passed Senate Bill (SB) 1383, effective January 1, 2022, which requires the community to reduce the amount of organic material sent to the landfill. Residents and businesses are required to properly sort organics into the correct cart/bin. To learn more about SB 1383 and how you can remain compliant, visit cvsan.org/SB1383.
