Levina was also a Sustainable Youth Intern at Earth Team at CVHS participating in monthly creek clean-ups and conducting home waste audits for their three bins project. Levina has also participated in Arroyo Creek Clean-Ups and the Beyond Terra Biodiversity Campaign. Levina's scholarship application essay describes what environmental stewardship means to her:

As stewards of the environment, we must hold ourselves accountable for the consequences of our actions and strive to build a community, in which everyone can make their contributions to pave a greener future.

Adam Fedorowicz has demonstrated his commitment to environmental leadership with his community work. He is currently a Cleaner and Greener Staff and a Gleaning Volunteer with ForestR while going to school at Castro Valley High School (CVHS). With the opportunity at ForestR, Adam has been working on litter pickup, land restoration and fruit harvests in our community and has recruited others to volunteer with him. Gleaning

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has been an area of focus where Adam, his family, friends and other volunteers have gleaned thousands of pounds of fruit over the last few years and donated it to food pantries for people in need. Adam's scholarship application essay described what environmental stewardship means to him:

Environmental stewardship to me, means leading by example and encouraging others to recognize the benefits of nature and the need to take good care of the surrounding environment, including its restoration due to harmful human activity.

Alina Huang has demonstrated her commitment to environmental leadership with community work. She served as an intern with Earth Team where she worked with water, soil, and air quality data to research environmental concepts and led discussions during Earth Team meetings and events. Huang is also the founder and president of the Animal Rights Club at CVHS. As an intern with Factory Farming Awareness Coalition, a nonprofit organization bringing attention to the environmental impacts of farming, Huang was recognized with the Animal Welfare Award for demonstrating determination and helping to advance the welfare of animals through education, research, and leadership. Huang's scholarship essay described what environmental stewardship means to her:


Environmental Stewardship to me is taking responsibility for the consequences that come from our actions and protecting the gifts that our home has given us. It is to show your efforts towards a greener future even with the smallest change.

Oliver Zhang has worked in the community to demonstrate his environmental leadership. He is the founder and president of Sunshine America Youth Organization where, since 2013, he has led 55 members on 47 Clean Hill Walks to pick up litter and restore 37,000 square feet of trails. As well, he has hosted environmental town halls and seminars. For his efforts with Sunshine America, Oliver has received the Gold Level President's Volunteer Service Award for the last four years. Zhang also led an Air Quality and Finance awareness campaign and trained 25 leaders by organizing weekly financial education seminars and college financial planning/IRS tax workshops. Zhang's scholarship essay explains what he believes environmental stewardship is:

As stewards we must seek to first preserve, and then restore our ailing planet so that future generations can likewise experience the true beauty of a fluttering sparrow in the frosty spring air, not just a lesser alternative. To protect Mother Nature, simply "good enough" is nowhere near enough.

Bolt demonstrated her environmental leadership by serving as President of the Smart Environment Club at Castro Valley High School (CVHS), participating in educating students about recycling, organics, and reducing waste, as well as organizing recycling and organics containers around campus. Bolt was also an Intern with Factory Farming

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Awareness Coalition, completing over 60 hours of service during the Summer of 2019 to receive certification giving presentations on the environmental impacts of farming. Bolt's scholarship essay described what environmental stewardship means to her:

To me, environmental stewardship is the responsibility for all to take part in the care and upkeep of our environment, whether that be in your backyard garden, a park that you frequent, or your own home. By leaving it better than you found it or striving to reduce your carbon footprint in any way that you can, any aspect of someone's life can be a means to practice environmental stewardship.

Boyd demonstrated her environmental leadership by serving as an Intern with Earth Team while going to CVHS where she works on a museum exhibit to promote sustainability regularly participating in clean-ups and restoration projects. Boyd was also an Environmental Commissioner at CVHS where she led the school's work on the Green Ribbon Program Application. Boyd's scholarship essay explains what she believes environmental stewardship is:

Environmental stewardship is nurturing the planet the same way it has nurtured me my entire life" and that "the motto If not me, then who? has guided me throughout my life, especially in my care for the environment. Leading by example is a powerful way to make a difference and inspire a society of conscious nature lovers.

The scholarship winners were invited to CVSan's Board of Directors meeting held on June 4, 2019. Environmental leadership was demonstrated by the scholarship winners

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through active membership in the Smart Environment Club at Castro Valley High School as well as volunteer work with the CVSan Green Hearts Team.

Chinn demonstrated her environmental leadership by creating, Reconnect Inc., a 501©3 non-profit organization that refurbishes and donates computers for students without one at home. Chinn created this club while in middle school and again as a non-profit when she attended Castro Valley High School. While at Canyon Middle School, Chinn also was part of the group of students that started the food scrap recycling program at Canyon and helped improve waste diversion. Given that Chinn believes that "it is now more important than ever for people to step up to become environmental stewards" Chinn's scholarship essay explains what she believes an environmental steward should do now:

At a minimum: reduce, reuse, recycle, and rot on a personal level, in our homes, schools, and businesses. We must challenge our friends and families to join us in our efforts. But that can't be all. We can make choices for greener homes, greener cars, and ultimately, greener lives.

Chan demonstrated her environmental leadership by serving as Co-President of the Smart Environment Club at Castro Valley High School, participating in educating students about recycling, organics, and reducing waste, as well as organizing recycling and organics containers around campus and coordinating Earth Day Clean-up efforts for the CVHS Garden. If everyone would walk two more steps to the right or to the left and throw their lunch trays or unfinished food into the compost bins that are set out instead of the trash, we could prevent a lot of methane from entering our fragile atmosphere.

After [the waste audit], I started to become more aware of where I threw my trash, which led me to realize that I don't really know which bins some of my trash goes in. That made me wonder if this was the case for all my other classmates, because of this I started focusing on creating presentations that educated the Smart Energy Club members about the power of recycling and composting and how to correctly compost and recycle.



The two scholarship winners were invited to CVSan's Board of Directors meeting on May 6, 2014. Environmental leadership was demonstrated by the scholarship winners through participation in CVSan's Community Advisory Committee and participation in environmental clubs at Castro Valley High School. Madeline Hahn described the motivation to become an environmental leader in her essay:

I don't think I even realized how much of an impact each person has on our environment until I attended a Davis Street Transfer Station tour sponsored by the Castro Valley Sanitary District. We looked at compost, recycling, clothes, but the image that stuck with me the most was looking into the massive warehouse full of "trash". Things that weren't put into the recycling or compost. I then imagined almost half of the "trash" in there disappearing. It could've turned into mulch to grow plants or trees to grow paper. The possibilities are endless for each small act of environmental awareness.
